Help in Case of Accident

In all cases of serious shock or injury, send for a doctor or ambulance at once. In the meantime, apply first aid promptly, but not hastily

BLEEDING WOUNDS—Bleeding in spurts indicates severing of an artery. Steady flow indicates a vein has been cut. Bleeding from an artery should be stopped by applying pressure of the thumb, a compress or cloth pad over the artery at a point between the bleeding wound and the heart. In bleeding from a vein (steady flow), pressure should be applied on the side away from the heart. Where bleeding is not severe, a compress over the open wound should be sufficient. If bleeding is very severe, tourniquet may be made by tying handkerchief, cloth, belt, strap or neck-tie around the part over compress and using small stick, pencil, or similar article with which to twist and tighten. Do not twist too hard, just enough to stop bleeding. Loosen every twenty minutes to let a little blood escape. Keep the part elevated

SHOCK—Lay patient flat on back with head low, unless head is bleeding. Remove false teeth, gum or tobacco from mouth. Keep patient warm. Give stimulants such as aromatic spirits of ammonia in water, hot coffee, tea or water. Do not give stimulant to unconscious patients, or one who may have internal bleeding.

POISONED WOUNDS—From bite of animal—Treat immediately. Wash under running water to remove animal saliva. Have patient lie down and remain quiet. Apply ligature or bandage above wound to prevent spread of poison. With tip of knife or razor blade, sterilized by passing through flame, if possible, cut into wound, a depth of $\frac{1}{8}$ to $\frac{1}{4}$ inch over each fang mark, and let poison out. Apply suction, or if no other means available, suck the wound out by mouth, provided there are no open sores or wounds in mouth, and remove as much poison as possible from it. Be careful not to swallow. Continue suction for about a half hour. Cauterize with nitric acid, chloride of zinc or nitrate of silver, or by applying white hot iron. Give patient stimulants and rush to doctor at once.

BURNS AND SCALDS—Skin unbroken. A paste of baking soda in water; cod-liver, olive, or castor oil; or vaseline. Cover with sterile gauze. Where skin is broken, apply wet baking soda, gentian violet jelly, picric acid gauze, or tannic acid jelly. Keep dressing moist. Chemical burns—wash immediately

IN CASE OF POISONING

First—Send for a physician.
Second—Induce vomiting by tickling throat with feather or finger. Drink hot water or strong mustard and water. Swallow sweet oil or whites of eggs.

Acids are antidotes for Alkalies and vice versa.

SPECIAL POISONS AND ANTIDOTES

ACIDS—Muratic, Oxalic, Acetic Sulphuric (Oil of Vitriol), Nitric (Aqua Fortis).
Ant.—Soap suds, magnesia, lime-water.

PRUSSIC ACID, Cyanide of Potassium.
Ant.—Ammonia in water. Dash water in face. Give stimulants.

CARBOLIC ACID—
Ant.—Flour and water, mucilaginous drinks.

ALKALIES, Potash, Lye, Hartshorn, Ammonia.
Ant.—Vinegar or lemon juice in water.

with large quantities of clean water before applying any other treatment.

FAINTING—Place flat on back, head lower than rest of body, loosen clothing, allow plenty of fresh air and keep warm.

LIGHTNING OR SUN STROKE—Loosen clothing, dash cold water on face, treat for shock. In case of sun stroke, remove to shade. Apply cold water to head.

ARTIFICIAL RESPIRATION — Prone Method
Some injuries such as electric shock, drowning, gas poisoning and choking interfere with breathing and may cause asphyxiation, unless normal breathing is promptly restored. Artificial respiration should be resorted to, to bring this about, but remember, **SEND FOR A DOCTOR IMMEDIATELY**

Lay the patient prone, (face down), the head "downhill", if possible, with one arm extended directly overhead, and the other arm bent at the elbow to form a resting place for the head, so that nose and mouth are free for breathing.

Kneel, straddling the patient's thighs, with palms of the hands on the small of the back, and fingers resting on the ribs, the little finger just touching the lowest rib, and the fingers extended straight down.

With arms held straight, swing forward slowly, bringing the weight of the body gradually upon the patient, so that the shoulder in this position is directly over the heel of the hand at the end of the forward swing. Do not bend elbows. Then immediately swing backward, so as to remove the pressure completely. After two seconds, repeat the pressure and release, the complete swing forward and backward to take four or five seconds, or 12 to 15 times a minute. Continue without interruption until the patient breathes naturally.

Patients have been revived after as long as four hours or more by this method. Keep up the artificial respiration and do not allow patient, even if he starts to breathe naturally, to stand or sit up. Keep patient warm and if doctor has not arrived by the time patient has revived, give light stimulants, 1 teaspoon of aromatic spirits of ammonia in a small glass of water, or hot drink of coffee or tea. Watch patient to see that normal breathing continues, and if natural breathing stops, begin artificial respiration again. If necessary, to change operator, the change should be made without losing the rhythm of respiration.

ARSENIC, Rat Poison, Paris Green.
Ant.—Milk, raw eggs, sweet oil, lime-water, flour and water.

BUG POISON, Lead, Saltpetre, Corrosive Sublimate, Sugar of Lead, Blue Vitriol.
Ant.—Whites of eggs or milk in large doses.

CHLOROFORM, Chloral, Ether.
Ant.—Give emetic, keep patient aroused; apply mustard plaster over heart and calves of legs, use artificial respiration.

CARBONATE OF SODA, Coperas, Cobalt.
Ant.—Soap suds and mucilaginous drinks.

IODINE, Antimony, Tartar Emetic.
Ant.—Starch and water, chalk, magnesia, starchy food, strong tea. Apply external heat.

MERCURY and its Salts
Ant.—Whites of Eggs, Milk Mucilages

OPIUM, Morphine, Laudanum, Paregoric, Soothing Powders or Syrups.

Ant.—Strong coffee, mustard or ipecacae as emetic. Keep awake and moving. Keep warm.

How to Prevent Fires

Most fire losses occurring in the United States and Canada, the two countries that lead the world in per capita loss, arise from causes easily preventable. You can reduce your probability of loss by attention to the following simple precautions:

1. Provide metal containers for hot ashes and prohibit the use of wooden receptacles.

2. Keep cellars, closets and stairways free from loose wrapping paper or other highly combustible material.

3. Equip your property so that it is easy to turn off current when leaving electric irons and other heating appliances, even for a short time.

4. Use only good standard fuses and never permit the substitution of coins or wires for blown fuses

5. Examine metal flues periodically and see that

they are renewed before they are badly weakened by internal rust or otherwise.

6. See that accumulations of soot are removed from your chimneys at least once in each year, preferably before lighting fires in the Fall.

7. Make sure that gasoline and other inflammable fluids, including kero, are kept out of rooms where there are open fires or flames of any kind.

8. Keep open lights (candles, gas) and portable electric heaters away from curtains or other inflammable material which may come in contact with them.

9. If oil mops are used on your floors, see to it that they are kept, when not in use, preferably on an incombustible floor (such as the concrete floor in your basement) and never in a closet.

10. Keep your supply of matches in a closed metal receptacle and out of reach of the children.

Rules in Case of Fire

Familiarize yourself with the location of windows and natural escapes.

Learn the position of all stairways, particularly the top landing and scuttle to the roof.

Keep the doors of rooms shut.

Wet a towel, stuff it in the mouth, breathe through it instead of nose, so as not to inhale smoke.

Never get excited, try to recall the means of exit.

If room fills with smoke keep close to floor and crawl along by the walls to the window.

NEVER go to roof, unless as a last resort and you know there is escape to adjoining buildings.

NEVER jump through flames in a building without covering the head with a blanket or heavy clothing.

Open windows from the top.

Common Stains and How to Remove Them

Blood and meat juice. Use cold water; soap and cold water; or starch paste.

Bluing. Use boiling water.

Chocolates and cocoa. Use borax and cold water, bleach if necessary.

Coffee and tea. (Clear)—Use boiling water; bleach if necessary. (With cream.)—Use cold water, then boiling water; bleach if necessary.

Cream and milk. Use cold water, then soap and cold water.

Egg. Use cold water.

Fruit and fruit juices. Use boiling water; bleach if necessary.

Grass. Use cold water; soap and cold water; alcohol, or a bleaching agent.

Grease and oils. Use French chalk blotting paper or other absorbent; or warm water and soap; or gasoline, benzine, or carbon tetrachloride.

Iodine. Use warm water and soap; alcohol; or ammonia.

Ink. Try cold water; then use an acid or bleach if necessary.

Iron. Use oxalic acid; hydrochloric acid; salts of lemon; or lemon juice and salt.

Kerosene. Use warm water and soap.

Lampblack and soot. Use kerosene, benzine, chloroform, ether, gasoline, or carbon tetrachloride.

Medicine. Use alcohol.

Mildew. If fresh, use cold water; otherwise try to bleach with javelle water or potassium permanganate.

Paint and varnish. Use alcohol, carbon tetrachloride, chloroform, or turpentine.

Perspiration. Use soap and warm water; bleach in the sun or with javelle water or potassium permanganate.

Pitch, tar and wheel grease. Rub with fat; then use soap and warm water; or benzine, gasoline, or carbon tetrachloride.

Scorch. Bleach in the sunshine or with javelle water.

Shoe polish. (Black.)—Use soap and water; or turpentine. (Tan.)—Use alcohol.

Syrup. Use water.

Stove polish. Use cold water and soap; or kerosene, benzine or gasoline.

Vaseline. Use kerosene or turpentine.

Water. Steam or sponge the entire surface of water-spotted materials.

Wax. Scrape off as much as possible. Use French chalk, blotting paper or other absorbent, with a warm iron; or use benzine or gasoline. If color remains, use alcohol or bleach.
