Jim Low (1940-2011)

With regret, we note the passing of **James W. A. Low** (1940 July 24 - 2011 September 6), known as Jim to the RASC family. Jim was a long-time member of the RASC (Montreal and Toronto Centres), whose active memory of the Society and astronomy in Canada spanned over half a century.

Jim was always a dedicated and intelligent observer, who played a leading role in his younger years in spurring observational activity and amateur discovery within the RASC nationally. He was, for a time, the National Co-ordinator of the Comet and Nova Section of our Standing Committee on Observational Activities - one of whose members was a young David Levy. (The Standing Committee on Observational Activities is the lineal ancestor of the present Observing Committee).

In addition to observing, Jim was also interested in the history of astronomy from an early date, and was able to follow that pursuit throughout his life. Jim was responsible for the preservation of some important material in our National Archives.

RASC members who had the chance to talk with Jim at Centre functions, GA's or on the RASCals list know how interesting his views could be, and how extensive was his knowledge and experience. He added much to the Society, and will be missed.

Kimmo Innanen (1937-2011)

With regret, we also note the passing of **Kimmo Innanen** (1937 March 12 - 2011 August 3). Prof. Innanen was an original member of York University's astronomy faculty, and a member in good standing of the Toronto Centre. His research in classical mechanics, relating to galactic astronomy and later to planetary astronomy, brought him together with Finnish astronomers at the universities of Helsinki and Turku. His contributions to the field were recognized there by the awarding of an honourary degree from the University of Turku and the naming of Asteroid 1941HJ, Asteroid Innanen. His continued research with his colleagues, up until this year, has contributed greatly to the knowledge of Trojan asteroids and near earth bodies.

1. The RASC has a new fundraising guide!

Prepared by Executive Director **Deborah Thompson**, this new guide is provided as part of the Centres and volunteer support program outlined in our strategic plan. The several purposes of the fundraising guide are:

- to help Centres and National Office understand their roles in relation to fundraising;
- to give volunteers a process for developing their fundraising plan;
- to give fundraisers helpful suggestions to assist in their fundraising efforts; and

• to outline factors fundraising volunteers must consider as they engage in fundraising activities for the Society.

Why is fundraising important to the RASC? To quote directly from the guide:

"Fundraising is one of the most important activities for a not-for-profit organization to undertake. For the RASC, fundraising is central to the advancement of the charitable role of the organization and to realizing our mission and vision. Although fundraising is not a new role for the RASC, our ability to better share and strengthen our knowledge in this area will serve the Society well."

If you or your Centre are wondering about fundraising, you now have a concise guide to lead you though the process. The <u>fundraising guide</u> and a <u>tip sheet</u> to help you get started can be found on the members only portion of our <u>Web site</u>.

2. Three-year NSERC Grant Application

We have completed and submitted a joint RASC/CASCA/FAAQ three-year grant application to NSERC PromoScience to further develop and deliver the web-based educational program, **Discover the Universe/À la découverte de l'univers**, an interactive, on-line astronomy training program for educators in remote and underserved communities.

The grant proposal executive summary describes the vision for this major, Canada-wide astronomy outreach initiative:

"Astronomy is a powerful tool for attracting young people to science. However, both schoolteachers and informal educators (youth group leaders, park interpreters, First Nations elders) often find astronomy intimidating to teach. This is especially true in poor or geographically remote communities that lack connections to universities or amateur astronomy clubs. To overcome this challenge, we will develop and offer a program of Web-delivered interactive astronomy training workshops and follow-up materials. Building on our successful 2011 pilot project, this interactive training will: (a) be easily accessible, in English and French, to educators who lack the resources to participate in traditional training programs, (b) provide educators with ready-made astronomy activities for their youth, and (c) let them build connections with professional and advanced amateur astronomers. Our program will give these educators the knowledge, tools, and confidence they need to teach astronomy. We estimate that we will reach over 16,000 young Canadians."
