Call for Images 2017 RASC Observer's Calendar by Paul Gray, RASC Observer's Calendar Editor

Astronomical images and sketches of all types are invited for consideration for publication in the 2017 RASC *Observer's Calendar* including: deep sky, wide field, solar system, astronomical sketches and dramatic astronomically themed landscapes.

Images can be prime focus, piggyback, eyepiece projection, or fixed tripod; and recorded on a digital/CCD camera, film, or webcam. Submitted images must be of sufficient quality and resolution to reproduce well at 9.5" x 12" and must be compatible with the "landscape" orientation of the calendar images. Generally, this will mean a resolution of at least 3825 x 3028 pixels for the print-ready tiff. We will also consider making a quilt or mosaic of lunar/planetary webcam captured images (so as not to over magnify an individual image for publication).

If you already have a gallery of images on your website, send me the link, but **please also direct me to your recent favourites**. Both well-known and obscure objects are published in the calendar, so to avoid having the same objects used too often, I will be screening for those that may have appeared in the past 3 years.

Please email submissions to me at Paul Gray. While I have a bottomless email box, it's best to send me jpegs first. If your image is selected, we will request a full-resolution tiff version. Full-resolution tiffs will be required for use in print. The deadline for submissions is 2016 February 28. If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to contact me at the above-mentioned email address.

The Year at a Glance – 2015

Our Society does wonderful things, many of which go unnoticed. To all those tireless volunteers working away in the background, we give a nod and a hearty "Thank You!"

Here are some of the things we noted throughout 2015, accomplishments and happenings:

- Early in January, a proposed Anti-Harassment Policy was considered by the Board of Directors. A Working Group formed by the Board brought forward a proposed policy that was eventually adopted as Policy G24
- The Board accepted a revision to the Society's Vision, Mission, and Values statements
- > We offered a new version of the popular planispheres on the eStore
- The Directors voted to grant \$1000 to a Mi'kmaw Moons research and outreach project undertaken by Dave Chapman and Cathy Leblanc
- > The Charlottetown Centre dissolved due to insufficient members

- We were invited to participate in the 20th Anniversary issue of SkyNews magazine, which we did with a special ad and letter to the editor
- Early in February, we began the process to upgrade our www.rasc.ca website to Drupal 7, hiring a contractor who completed the work in June
- The Board approved a new Publications Policy C11, outlining editor responsibilities, as well as compensation—a first!
- April brought an invitation from the Prime Minister's Office to attend a major announcement whereby the Government of Canada would fund nearly \$250 million for the dome of the Thirty Metre Telescope, plus the Adaptive Optics System to be designed at the National Research Council's headquarters in Victoria.
- The Toronto Centre accepted the donation of ownership of the David Dunlap Observatory
- On Good Friday, we received news that SkyNews magazine was for sale, which happily resulted in the RASC purchasing the magazine in late June
- As a result of concerns that smaller Centres may not meet the minimum number of members to retain Centre status, the Board revised the Policy Manual (C6) to remove the minimum-number requirement.
- The Society upgraded all of the computers at the Society Office in May, installing new hardware and software, plus a new backup system. We also engaged a fulltime technical-support person.
- The Board accepted and approved a new policy creating a Special Projects Program
- An Awards Working group met over a period of months and returned a report on our Awards structure, recommending some changes, including long-service recognition
- The RASC conducted the first tour of many more to come, with a week in Southern California, visiting observatories and points of interest

- A new Fundraising Committee was formed to function as one of the Society's Permanent Committees
- Orders of Observer's Handbooks have increased over previous years, with a new buyer in Kalmbach Publications (Astronomy magazine); a second order late in December for 200 more Handbooks made for a welcome surprise
- Society membership levels exceeded all other years, with numbers now above 5000
- Finally, late in December, we received notification from the Governor General, David Johnston, giving acceptance of our invitation for him to be our patron (see the report elsewhere in the Bulletin)

There are probably some events missed or overlooked, but this gives a great flavour for the activities of the Board and the Society overall. Happy New Year!

December Solstice 2015 CASCA Newsletter by Eric Briggs, RASC, Toronto Centre

The December Solstice 2015 edition of the Cassiopeia Newsletter, from the Canadian Astronomical Society/SociétéCanadienned'Astronomie, has been published (http://casca.ca/?p=6741). The newsletter includes an update from Canada's academic astronomers on the situation at the Thirty Metre Telescope, an update on the Mauna Kea Spectroscopic Explorer (which will replace the Canada-France-Hawaii Telescope), and observations by the BRITE constellation of five nanosatellites, two of them Canadian, which are doing variable-star photometry from Earth orbit.

Talks in the Ottawa Area

Robert Dick (RASC-LPAC) will be speaking on the evening of Wednesday, January 13, starting at 6:30 pm until 8 pm. to the local chapter of the IEEE, He will be will be using outdoor lighting as an example where something good can have unforeseen side effects. Robert will also be teaching a short course at the University of Ottawa: The Biology of Darkness." It is intended to give students a better understanding of how evolution has made our biology dependant on the natural environment and how lighting the night impacts the ecology.
