<u>Total Solar Eclipse – Monday 2017 August 21</u>

The first total solar eclipse to be widely observed in North America since 1979 will take place this August. The eclipse will be total along a path spanning the continental United States. Hundreds of RASC members have already made plans to observe this event somewhere along the path.

The eclipse will be partial across all of Canada. There will be great interest in the eclipse.

The Society plans to support Centres holding public observing sessions of the partial phases. Solar viewers have been ordered and will be provided to all Centres.

RASC Yukon Centre Activities

What an exciting summer for Astronomy in the Yukon!

Thus far, we have managed to complete, and submit, a Feasibility Study for the first Yukon Public Astronomical Observatory @ the Takhini Hotsprings. This observatory will boast an iStar 9-inch refractor on an Astro-900 mount. In June, the City of Whitehorse approved a second public observatory, as part of the new Chadburn Lake Park project on Canyon (Grey) Mountain. This second observatory is scheduled for construction in the next three to five years. It will host a full Science Centre, as the Takhini observatory will host a complete Nature Interpretive Centre. Air North, Air New Zealand, Yukon Tourism & Culture, Dr. Ian Griffin of the Otago Museum in Dunedin, New Zealand, and the Yukon Astronomical Society (RASC: Yukon Centre) have recently put a plan in motion to offer the pilot for North America's first-ever Aurora Borealis flights, scheduled to begin here in Whitehorse, Yukon, and a second Flight to the Lights (Aurora Australis) adventure, set for take-off in March 2018. **Air North is offering first dibs to members of The Royal Astronomical Society of Canada**. 76 seats on a 3.5 hour flight across the Arctic Circle, and into the Aurora's oval, in a Boeing 737-500 at 36,000 feet, while in a darkened cabin for excellent astrophotography. This will be an excellent opportunity to promote *SkyNews* on-board every flight we will offer!! More information will follow shortly!!

Our Society has prepared and sent a Yukon-wide outreach program for the partial solar eclipse on August 21st. All Yukon communities have requested solar viewers from the RASC, and will provide local animation, from Old Crow to Teslin and Tagish, from Watson Lake to Beaver Creek, and Kluane National Park! We are ready for a fantastic show!!

The Society has begun looking to offer the membership in 2018 radio astronomy, and to eventually network with the Okanagan Centre.

Last year, our members talked about establishing a network of cameras throughout the Yukon, that would provide meteorological and atmospheric information to our observatory about cloud cover, meteor activity, and aurora activity year-round. In July, we joined with Cold Climate Innovations, a department of the Yukon College, to develop an AllSky camera that was suited to our North. A prototype was built in 2016, and tested. Now we are ready to manufacture them, and distribute them to municipalities, or businesses, around the Yukon, Canada, and internationally. Our first customer is Dawson City, where Anthony Gucciardo installed this system on the weekend of July 29 to 31.

The Society was invited to even more summer camps this year. It seems space themed weeks are becoming much more popular in the Yukon - and, it is the first

summer that the French community in Whitehorse has invited us to give a presentation in French!!
