

2010 Observer's Calendar - Call for Images

Astronomical images of all types are invited for consideration for publication in the 2010 *Observer's Calendar* including: deep sky, solar system, and dramatic astronomically themed landscapes. Images can be prime focus, piggyback, eyepiece projection, or fixed tripod; and recorded on a digital/CCD camera or film.

Submitted images must be of sufficient quality and resolution to reproduce well at 10" x 12.5" and must be compatible with the "landscape" orientation of the calendar images. Generally, this will mean a resolution of at least 1200 pixels tall.

If you already have a gallery of images on your Web site, send me the link, but also direct me to your favourites. Both well-known and obscure objects are published in the calendar, so to avoid having the same objects used too often, I will be screening for those that may have appeared in recent years.

Please email submissions to me <u>here [6]</u>. While I have a bottomless email box, it's best to send me jpegs first. If your image is selected, I will request a full resolution tiff version. The deadline for submissions is **2009 June 15**. If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to contact me.

10th Anniversary of Torrance Barrens Dark Sky Preserve

This year is the 10th anniversary of the Torrance Barrens as a Dark Sky Preserve. To recognize this accomplishment, there will be a dedication ceremony at the Barrens on the afternoon of Saturday, **October 17**. If you plan to be in the area, you are all welcome.

Initially, the Torrance Barrens (about 2-hours north of Toronto) was a Provincial Conservation Reserve due to its unique landscape and vegetation. The Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources (OMNR) and the Muskoka Heritage Foundation (MHF), with the support of the RASC, declared it a Dark Sky Reserve on 1999 August 11. In 2001, the RASC recognized it as a RASC Dark Sky Preserve, which began the national DSP Program that now covers the country. In recognition of the IYA 2009, the RASC will be celebrating the 10th anniversary of the Torrance Barrens DSR/DSP along side the OMNR and the MHF.

There will be a number of planned activities at the Barrens and in nearby communities. At midday, there will be a ceremony at the site with Ministry, municipal and environmental groups in attendance along with the media. Guided nature hikes through the area will follow. Indoor displays and family activities are being

organized in a nearby town. In the evening, there will be stargazing at the site and guided walking tours after dark to experience the nocturnal wildlife through sights and sounds.

More information will be posted in the *Bulletin* as plans develop.

Over the past 15 months, I've been working on a new composition for orchestra – inspired by my love of astronomy, and now dedicated to the RASC.

Orion – Suite for Orchestra, is in 5 movements subtitled: Horsehead, M42, Orion's Belt, Betelgeuse, and Rigel. I am making the MP3 file of the entire suite available for download to RASC members at no charge. The entire suite is a little under 28 minutes with the movement durations lasting 5m32s, 6m6s, 5m35s, 4m47s, and 5m55s respectively. Depending on the speed of your broadband Internet connection, it may take up to 10 minutes to download the MP3 file.

Neptune is the "star" at the top left. Jupiter's moon, Ganymede, is to the left of Jupiter, and Callisto is to the right. Europa is washed out by Jupiter's glare. The bright star to the upper right of Jupiter is Mu Capricorn.
