

Looking Up, the thoroughly researched and entertainingly written "official" history of the RASC, is now available again. Long out-of-print, and difficult to obtain used, the book has been digitized in its entirety as an initiative of the History Committee working with **Walter MacDonald** of the Kingston Centre, and this year's recipient of a RASC Service Award. *Looking Up* covers the story of the RASC from its pre-history in the later 19th-century up to 1994, and is profusely illustrated. The author, **R. Peter Broughton**, a long-time RASC member and past president of the Society, is a recognized authority on the history of astronomy in Canada.

Apple iPhone/iPod Touch "SkyCharts" Web App Available

Brian Gibson, a member of the Mississauga RASC Centre, has developed a Clear Sky Chart web application for Apple iPhone/iPod Touch users. It is available (free) from the <u>Apple Web Apps Site</u> [7]. It is currently the featured web app in the Weather category as well as one of the top ten most popular. This tool provides similar functionality to the <u>Windows Vista ClearSkyClock</u> [9] sidebar gadget that he released in 2007.

Calgary Centre's new Roll-Off Roof Observatory Building Grand Opening



In 2008, the members of the RASC Calgary Centre voted to commemorate the 50th anniversary of their Centre, and the 25th anniversary of their Wilson Coulee Observatory by approving the construction of a Roll-Off Roof Observatory Building. Designed by then President **Larry McNish**, the large 8x18-ft structure allows up to 4 scopes to use the building simultaneously.

In addition to the curved and sloped powered rolling roof (which allows polar alignment when open), the upper half of the south-facing wall is divided into four independent sections which can be manually folded down to provide an unobstructed southern view. The building is expected to provide a haven for astrophotographers and visual observers who want to get out of the wind, especially on cold winter nights. On June 27 IYA2009, the Calgary Centre inaugurated its new Roll-Off Roof Observatory building at its annual June Bar-B-Q. Canadian \$30 IYA Coin

Astronomy fans, nature lovers, and coin collectors alike will be impressed by the Royal Canadian Mint's Sterling Silver IYA collector coin [16]. As a tribute to the global celebration of the field of astronomy four centuries after Galileo Galilei recorded his pioneering observations that revolutionized human understanding of our universe, this beautiful coloured coin features an observatory surrounded by outer-space icons such as a galaxy, a comet, and the planet Saturn. These shimmering objects stand out against the coloured background of a starry night sky appearing blue on the horizon and gradually darkening to black. This eye-catching design is the work of Toronto artist **Colin Mayne**. The obverse features the portrait of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. The IYA souvenir coin is limited to a mintage of 10,000 and is available for \$89.95 CDN. This coin is certified to be sterling silver with a weight of 33.75 grams and a diameter of 40 millimetres.

General Assembly & Saskatchewan Summer Star Party

Hello everyone! Greetings from the General Assembly/Sask Summer Star Party - Aug 13 - 16, 2009!

Well - it is 2 weeks to go to the first-ever RASC General Assembly held at a Dark-Sky Preserve, or a star party, for that matter, and here's the poop!

We have 306 people registered as of July 14 - this alone will make it the largest SSSP ever, and we still have a month of later registrants to go! Our larger attendance will put a strain on our facilities, but we will do our best to make things run smoothly. Currently registrants from 9 provinces,1 territory and a few US states are making plans to be with us!

If you haven't registered yet, it is about time that you did! If you intend to walk-in last minute, you will likely not have the Friday Social or Saturday banquet available since there are only 50 tickets left for each - likely will be gone within the next 8 days. Plan to get your mail-in registrations to us by the August long weekend, or if you will decide later than that, just wait to pay at the star party, since organizers will be on site by August 11 or 12. Drop in participants are always welcome.

The accommodation situation remains the same - we are short resort hotel/cabin/condo rooms - same as we were a year ago - so if you are holding onto a room you won't use or are willing to double up, please let me know so we can fill some of our waiting list. If you need to stay under a roof and haven't booked yet, then you will need to stay in Maple Creek, 20 minutes away. You should also book for the 2010 SSSP soon - we will have a room shortage then, too, since they are still renovating the cabins. 2011 onward will have the full contingent of rooms available. If you are camping - no problem - the Meadows campground is huge. Bring your own table, though - always chronically short of picnic tables up there. There are only about 48 powered sites.

Winery Tour - we have room for about 18 more people, and the tour will not conflict with the

National Council close-out meeting, so NC members can either leave with the main tour or catch up soon after if you want to go! Sign up now!

Moon at GA/SSSP 2009 - we planned this star party with the 3rd quarter moon in the sky during the first night as not to conflict with Starfest and their organizers who are attending our GA/SSSP. So come on time and stay after the official GA/SSSP dates to enjoy dark skies of the Cypress Hills DSP. Even though we will have some moon to start, you will be treated to an occultation of the Pleiades by the moon on Aug 13/14 - watch the stars wink out on the bright edge and reappear on the dark edge. You will have to be set up on the S side of the Meadows to see this, since it occurs low in the sky.
